



THE OLD RULE of men's style was simple: striped shirt, solid tie and vice-versa. But as with the markets (free-agent and global), the old rules no longer apply. Today, men of style take the traditional navy pinstripe suit and throw it together with stripes upon more stripes. (Rule of thumb: keep your shirt stripes narrow and your tie stripes wide — otherwise, you'll look like an Excel sheet.) "When you present yourself properly, nobody can point a finger," the 29-year-old right-hander says.
